
As of June 1,2022, Pastor Teri Johnson will be serving as our Interim Pastor.

Pioneer Cemetery

On Thursday, May 12, 2022, a derecho wind storm came through the Pioneer Cemetery next to Pioneer Lutheran church. We lost trees, most of them old evergreens that were uprooted while others were snapped off at about half of their height. We were fortunate that only a few headstones received minor damage.

The cemetery board hired a tree service company to clear the large trees and the root balls left lying throughout the cemetery. We also had some dedicated volunteers come out to pick up branches and other debris in the cemetery. We had small and large tractors, different sized trailers, chain saws, rakes and shovels and many muscles working. The remains of the trees were all hauled away and work continued as the large holes left by the uprooted trees were filled with several loads of dirt and leveled off.


We have more work that is needed, but for a few days we will let things rest as many of our volunteers had damage at their own homes to clean up and some need to be in the field planting their crops.

You will find Pioneer Cemetery looks much different now, but it is still a beautiful, peaceful and reverent place to visit. Out hope is that in a year the newly planted grass will cover the scars left by the missing trees. Dear Friends in Christ,

Welcome to the season of Pentecost! Acts 2: 1 reads: "When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they sitting." I don't know about you, but when I hear 'the rush of a violent wind filled the entire house,' my anxiety heightens as memory takes me back to recent storms. In full transparency, wind is not something I


particularly enjoy as it has toppled neighborhood trees and strewn rooftop shingles all over my yard. During winter months wind creates something I loathe called "wind chill". However on a hot summer day, a breeze feels wonderful and without wind, kite flying would be nonexistent not to mention wind turbines. I confess I have a love/hate relationship with wind.

Perhaps that's why I need Pentecost as a reminder that the Holy Spirit is compared with wind....a mighty wind. What happens when we gather each Sunday to worship God is that the Holy Spirit swoops in and out among us, knitting us together through the songs we sing, the prayers we pray, the breaths we breathe. It can happen with two people and it can happen with two thousand people. The wind of the Holy Spirit can comfort, confuse or clarify things for us but never shames us.

Scripture is full of stories of adventure and how the Holy Spirit moves and directs God's people. The Pentecost story from the book of Acts begs the question whether we still believe in a God who blows through closed doors and sets our heads on fire? Do we still believe in a God with power to transform us, both as individuals and as a congregation, or have we come to a quiet assumption that our God is old and tired, a deity to address our prayer requests but not anyone we really expect to change our lives?

The Pentecost story challenges me to stop and feel the breath of the Holy Spirit blowing through my life rearranging things and opening things up. My devotion for Pentecost read: "Take a breath. Now just keep breathing. This is God's moment-bymoment gift to us. We can call it air or we can call it Holy Spirit. It counts on us to warm it up, to lend it our lives. In return, it promises to fill us with new wind, to set our heads on fire, giving us tongues to speak of things we cannot begin to understand. Do we still believe in a God who acts like that? More importantly, do we still experience a God who acts like that?" As we worship together this Pentecost season, may we come with expectant hearts eager to see what happens next!
