### PIONEER LUTHERAN CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING JANUARY 8, 2023

Secretary's report of the last meeting was read, then approved with a motion by Kevin Quail and seconded by Laura Quail.

Treasurer's Report was distributed with questions answered by Treasurer, Julie Peterson. Report approved with a motion by Bill Powers and seconded by Laura.

#### **OLD BUSINESS**

Council reviewed, then made final adjustments to the budget proposal for 2023. The budget will be introduced and offered for approval at the Annual Meeting held on January 22, 2023.

Dear Friends in Christ,

Many of us were introduced to Epiphany through the familiar silhouetted-image of Three Wise Men bearing gifts as they followed the Great Star by night. This month we celebrate the season of Epiphany. The word *epiphany* means *appearance* or manifestation. Society conjures images of having a light bulb turned on, or of being able to see something that was once hidden from view. Our readings for the Sundays in Epiphany tell the many ways that people came to understand who Jesus was, through his baptism and many miracles.

What can we learn from the Wise Men this season?

First, the Wise Men began their journey because of their beliefs. It was a common belief that when a world leader like a king was born that a special stellar phenomenon would appear in the sky. The Wise Men saw something that convinced them that they had seen the long-awaited sign. Historians tell us that the Jews, the Romans, and the Persians were all watching the skies about that time, looking for signs of the birth of an extraordinary king. A few years before, around 11 BC, Halley's Comet had been seen. There were other stellar phenomena, including a bright star, Sirius, which appeared brightly in the daytime instead of at night. The Wise Men saw the star and began their journey. May God give us all inspiration for this year's journey.

Second, the Wise Men were willing to follow what they had seen into unknown territory. Their journey took them outside their country and their comfort zone. The Wise Men risked the consequences of disobeying Herod, who was known to behave violently and ruthlessly when provoked and returned to their country by another way. The Christian journey is often an off-road excursion.

Third, the Wise Men were committed to the journey...wherever the star might lead. The Wise Men set out to find a newborn King by following a star and ended up in finding a baby born to young, relatively poor parents! Not exactly what they expected. In this coming year, may we look to heaven for guidance and comfort and may we accept God's blessings in whatever forms we find them, just as the Wise Men accepted that their long, expensive journey led them to a baby born to young, inexperienced parents who lived on the poor side of town.

Finally, the Wise Men brought gifts. In this season of Epiphany, may we think of the gift we will offer to God in the coming year. The gift of time? The gift of our talents? The gift of our service to our community? The gift of our witness and testimony? The gift of undying love and devotion to Jesus?

Star of wonder; star of light. Star with royal beauty bright. Westward leading, still proceeding. Guide us to thy perfect light.

May the guiding light of Jesus' birth and love guide and guard us in the New Year.

Robert Southwell (1561-1595) was an Englishborn Catholic who left his homeland while a young man to enter the Jesuit priesthood. Upon taking holy orders, he requested to return to his home country to minister during the tumultuous and violent years that followed the English Reformation. At that time, doing so had been declared by the monarchy to be an act of treason. Southwell expected he would become a martyr. Indeed, after several years of underground ministry, he was betrayed and arrested. He spent three years imprisoned, undergoing horrific torture multiple times. Finally, in 1595, he was tried for treason, found guilty, and given the customary sentence for Catholics and other dissenters: he was carried in a cart to the gibbet where he was hanged and disemboweled. His body was quartered and his head held aloft to the watching crowd.

He wrote the following poem while imprisoned.

#### The Burning Babe

As I in hoary winter's night stood shivering in the snow,

Surpris'd I was with sudden heat which made my heart to glow;

And lifting up a fearful eye to view what fire was near,

A pretty Babe all burning bright did in the air appear;

Who, scorched with excessive heat, such floods of tears did shed

As though his floods should quench his flames which with his tears were fed.

"Alas!" quoth he, "but newly born, in fiery heats I fry,

Yet none approach to warm their hearts or feel my fire but I!

My faultless breast the furnace is, the fuel wounding thorns,

Love is the fire, and sighs the smoke, the ashes shame and scorns;

The fuel Justice layeth on, and Mercy blows the coals,

The metal in this furnace wrought are men's defiled souls,

For which, as now on fire I am to work them to their good,

So will I melt into a bath to wash them in my blood."

With this he vanish'd out of sight and swiftly shrunk away.

And straight I called unto mind that it was Christmas day.
